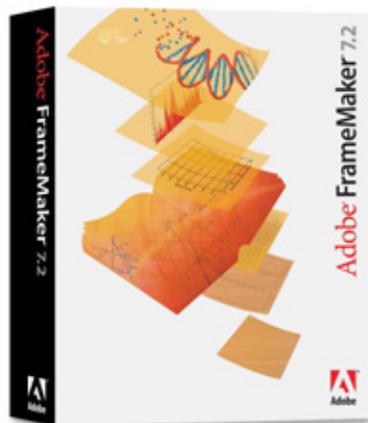

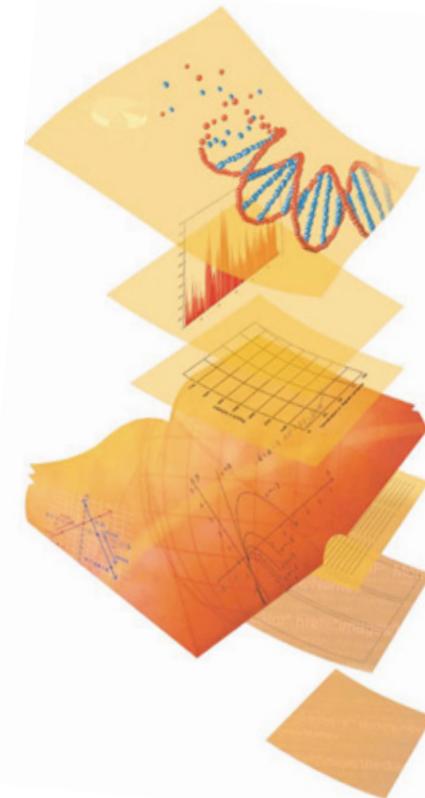

Considering working from home?

The possibility of working from home attracted much interest on the ISTC online discussion group last month and is a topic that has attracted much interest nationwide. A growing number of employees as well as employers are considering flexible working as a viable option with many benefits to employees and employers. Benefits include office space savings, improved retention of employees, reduced commute times and costs, as well as a better life balance.

This year, Work Wise UK launched a three-year national campaign to encourage flexible working and predicts that the percentage of home workers – people who work mainly in their own home, or in different places using home as a base – could grow to as much as 50% of the workforce within five years. In the UK, home workers form 11% of the total workforce (3.1 million out of 28.76 million), according to Work Wise UK.

HR adviser Businessshr reports that since 6 April 2003, the parents of children under the age of six or disabled children under 18 have had the right to request flexible working arrangements, provided they have worked continuously for the employer for a minimum of 26 weeks. However, the right to work from home is not automatic and an employer might be unable to accommodate the request.

Requests to change working hours, times of work or the location of work should be made in writing. Amongst other requirements, the written request should detail what work arrangements the employee is requesting, when the change in working practice would occur and the likely impact on the business. More detailed guidelines on the requirements needed to make a written request are available on the Work Wise UK website at www.workwiseuk.org, or on Business Link's guidelines developed by the Department of Trade and Industry at <http://tinyurl.co.uk/2b8d>. Please note that you can only make one request each year, although temporary change and a trial period can be agreed upon. Therefore, you should consider all aspects of the request carefully.

If you want to become a home worker, Quality Management Editor **Iain Wright FISTC**, who is a home worker himself, recommends you consider the following.

1. Insurance

According to an overview of current legislation by Flexible Employment Options, an organisation normally covers the insurance of the employee while he or she is on the company premises, but additional insurance is required if an employee is working from home.

Personal insurance

Am I covered by the company's personal accident insurance or injury compensation schemes?

Property insurance

Does the company's property insurance cover all company equipment provided for home-based and occasional home working?

Liability insurance

Does the company's liability insurance operate in the home-based working environment?

2. Health and safety

According to an overview of current legislation by Flexible Employment Options, "if individuals are working from home, the employer has a responsibility to ensure that the home environment is suitable and safe for the purposes of work".

As a result, the employer will have to conduct a risk assessment of your home-working environment or home-office. Your work station will be checked to ensure it is safe and ergonomically correct.

3. Communications and equipment

You might require:

- A separate phone line
- Anti-surge protection on your power supplies
- Information security and backup

You might need to have a fireproof, secure, data store elsewhere in the house; the means of accessing the company's network needs to be secure and all antivirus software must be updated daily.

4. Critical checks

- You should advise your mortgage lender before commencing home-based working.
- You should check with your home insurer that your policy is not affected by home working.
- You might need to check with your trade union that you will still be covered by them and to which branch you will belong.

Employment in technical communication is well suited to home working or other flexible working options and is becoming a more commonplace and popular practice. It need not only be a sought-after working ideal; it could become a reality for you.

IBM technology translates Arabic media broadcasts into English

Global computer company IBM has developed technology to translate Arabic media broadcasts into English in near real-time and has licensed the technology to Critical Mention, a web-based real-time television news search and broadcast monitoring service.

Codenamed "TALES" (Translingual Automatic Language Exploitation System), the IBM technology processes the audio signal from Arabic television and radio stations and translates its spoken content into English text. Once this text is indexed by the CriticalTV platform, Critical Mention's clients will be able to conduct real-time searches of Arabic media and receive alerts instantly when a search term is detected.

Under the agreement, IBM Research will provide Critical Mention a multi-year license to its speech-to-text translation solution for Arabic and English sources, with the ability to expand to other languages in the future.

The TALES system combines three core technologies: search, speech-to-text conversion, and statistical machine translation. If a user selects a news source and a particular video clip, for example, the spoken words in this foreign language file are converted into written words. TALES then translates the

written foreign-language text into the target language, English in this case. To provide the most accurate results, TALES uses statistical machine translation that employs automatically extracted word-to-word and phrase-to-phrase translations as used by the United Nations' simultaneous translators. The statistical model for translation improves TALES effectiveness in capturing the meaning of the news it translates.

Critical Mention is also adapting the speech-to-text conversion and statistical machine translation components to integrate with its existing TV search and monitoring platform, CriticalTV, to provide subscribers with real-time monitoring of Arabic TV.

Letters to the Editor

So you write manuals... but do you think you could write a novel?

Every November, thousands of people across the world attempt to write a 50,000 word novel in 30 days for no other reason than to prove they can. National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo) was founded in Oakland, USA, in 1999. Now in its eighth year, it has produced millions of words, thousands of novels, several published authors, and quite a lot of money for the Room to Read and Libraries in Laos projects.

Last year, I was one of the 59,000 people taking part, and for the first time in four years of trying, I completed my 50,000 words (if not the novel itself). The idea is to start as soon as you please after 00:01 on the morning of 1 November; by 23:59 on 30 November, you must have your word count verified on the NaNoWriMo website in order to become a winner. There's no official prize, but the sense of accomplishment is for most of us a reward in itself.

Writing 1,667 words a day is quite a daunting task, particularly while holding down a full-time job, but for me it offered some wonderful light relief from the strictures of technical writing. In order to achieve the full word count, I had to turn off my inner editor (quite a scary

proposition) and just write (type) as much as I could, as fast as I could. Everything I wrote came out of my imagination, rather than being based on technical specifications and software screenshots and vague hints from developers. It's exhilarating and liberating to be free to write whatever you like and let the commas go hang, although it proved impossible to stop myself occasionally going back and correcting grammar and punctuation, and improving readability.

Doing NaNoWriMo doesn't have to be a solitary experience though, and there's plenty of support and advice for those who want it. The website forums are arranged by genre, by geographical area, and also include threads in which to ask questions, rant or rejoice. Meetups and write-ins are arranged by your friendly local municipal liaison and you might get some official NaNoWriMo goodies if you're lucky!

Introducing CrossCheck for multilingual DTP documents

Global Databases has announced the release of its CrossCheck software service, which makes the automated verification of DTP documents now a reality. Using artificial intelligence to check translated DTP documents against an original document in another language, CrossCheck scans documents for text, formatting and graphic layout errors.

CrossCheck works as a plug-in, operating inside Adobe DTP applications such as InDesign and FrameMaker, making it fast and user-friendly.

There are hundreds of errors CrossCheck can report; users choose which errors to check in the options menu, creating different profiles for different documents. Searches can include text which has not yet been translated and missing text, mismatching numbers, text overflows, errors in fonts, missing graphic objects and many more.

“We believe that CrossCheck will fundamentally redefine the documentation QA process. It will significantly impact the cost and time it takes companies to produce quality assured documentation”, said **Susan Warham**, Global Databases Director of Marketing.

WebWorks Publisher 2003 product line discontinued

Quadralay, the creators of WebWorks, have announced that as of 1 July this year, WebWorks Publisher Professional 2003 and associated 2003 products were retired. With the successful launch of WebWorks ePublisher Pro more than a year ago and the recent release of WebWorks ePublisher Express in July, Quadralay decided to end the 2003 product line. Quadralay says this means that its development and support resources can more effectively serve the needs of its customers.

On 30 September 2006, standard technical support for the WebWorks Publisher 2003 product line will end. Existing support documents and content will continue to be available through the WebWorks Support Center website area, but support request processing will formally end on this date for this product line. Enterprise customers, under qualified conditions via consulting arrangements, will be eligible for continued 2003 product support.

Adobe releases FrameMaker 7.2 application packs for DITA and S1000D

Adobe has released the Adobe FrameMaker 7.2 Application Packs for Darwin Information Typing Architecture (DITA) and S1000D. The packs aim to enable developers to fully evaluate and enhance the XML authoring and publishing capabilities within FrameMaker using two leading open standards. Both application packs are companion pieces to the Adobe FrameMaker Developer Kit (FDK) that provides sample content, tools, applications and documentation.

Adobe says that current and future market trends are driving companies to re-evaluate their authoring and publishing requirements. Adobe identifies the following trends:

- There is a continuing need to publish large volumes of information.
- XML is used for multi-channel publishing and to reduce costs in authoring and translation.
- The majority of Adobe FrameMaker customers are already working with XML, so there is a demand for additional support for standards that support XML.
- XML is the fastest growing output among Adobe FrameMaker customers.
- XML is also key to integrating new media and personalisation/customisation.

- The implementation cost (training, consulting, etc) of a new XML authoring and publishing system can be cost-prohibitive. Therefore, customers want to take advantage of the high availability of qualified Adobe FrameMaker users and the wide variety of consulting resource.
