We have new logos

If you read the President's View this time last year, you may remember me exhorting you to proclaim your membership (if you are a Member or a Fellow) by proudly displaying the ISTC logo and an accompanying statement of meaning.

Always ready to make life as simple as possible, we have a new set of logos that remove the need to explain what the logo means. Two versions are available: a small one in portrait orientation and a larger one in landscape. The logos are available from the ISTC website (you will need to login) and can be used on your website, business cards and so on.

Why do the new logos say 'Certified Member' and 'Certified Fellow'? Again, it's part of making it clear that we are not just a club. We don't accept just anyone to the Member or Fellow categories: you have to earn the right. As a minimum, your CV is reviewed when you apply to join, and if you are a Fellow, you continue to earn the right through your CPD record. The new logos proclaim that the ISTC has certified that you have reached the required standard for Member or for Fellow.

As you'll see from elsewhere in the journal, we had a large number of entries for the Technical Communication UK Awards.

Congratulations to all our winners, and it's good to see that the announcement has generated some discussion. Who knows: maybe we'll break the record for the number of entries next year.

The Horace Hockley award is for contributions to our profession, and this year we are pleased to announce that the recipient is Dr Hans van der Meij, who you may know as a contributor to Minimalism Beyond the Nurnberg Funnel. The Mike Austin award is for someone who has contributed to the ISTC over a number of years - and this year I'm very pleased to announce that it has been awarded to Theresa Cameron for her tireless work in promoting the ISTC internationally, and in making sure our voice is heard.
