



## \$2.4 million a year for Innodata Isogen

Innodata Isogen, a provider of knowledge process outsourcing services, as well as publishing and related information technology services, has signed several significant new knowledge process outsourcing (KPO) deals.

These wins, in addition to the editorial services agreement the company announced in early July, 'demonstrate that we continue to see strong demand for our services from clients seeking to lower the costs of creating and managing content,' said Jack Abuhoff, Chairman and CEO of Innodata Isogen. 'Our focus on KPO and publishing services enables us to deliver enormous value to our clients.'

The company expects that the new deals will generate the following estimated revenues per year of each contract:

- ▶ \$1 million for services to a publisher of hobbyist and specialty books and magazines
- ▶ \$450,000 for content creation services to a leading provider of information to the healthcare industry
- ▶ \$350,000 for legal editorial services to a

multinational publisher

- ▶ \$300,000 for content creation services to a leading information services provider to the insurance industry
- ▶ \$300,000 for content creation services to a leading European media services company

On 8 July, Innodata Isogen announced that it had signed an agreement with a leading scientific journal publisher to provide a broad range of editorial services. The five-year agreement is expected to generate \$1.5 million per year in recurring KPO revenue.

## Industry news

### Indexing winners announced

At the annual dinner on Saturday 12 July during the Society of Indexers' (SI) conference at Winchester University, SI President Professor John Sutherland presented the Wheatley Medal for an outstanding index to Barbara Hird. Barbara won the award for her index to *The Oxford history of literary translation in English, vol. 1: To 1550*, edited by Roger Ellis (OUP, 2008).

The panel of judges was pleased with both the quality and variety of indexes submitted for the award this year but agreed that Barbara Hird was a worthy winner of the medal. *The Oxford history of literary translation in English* was felt to be the sort of collection that requires a good index to maximise the book's value.

'This requirement is certainly met here,' said the chair of the judges, Professor Peter Willett of Sheffield University's Department of Information Studies. 'One immediately notices the very clear layout, with an excellent use of variant typefaces and of indentation. More detailed inspection reveals the judicious selection of terms that has been made, the excellent cross-referencing

structure, and more specialist attributes such as the handling of multiple translations of the same text.'

Philip Hillyer was highly commended for his index to Bill Bell's *The Edinburgh history of the book in Scotland* (Edinburgh University Press, 2007). 'This was another excellent index,' said Professor Willett. He added that the index, strong on concepts and well presented, handled the many corporate authors that characterise the subject in an elegant way.

Finally, Liza Furnival was commended for her index to the World Health Organization's *Quality assurance of pharmaceuticals*

Barbara Hird has been a Registered Indexer, and subsequently a Fellow of the Society of Indexers, since 1985, specialising in the history and culture of the ancient world, late antiquity and the middle ages, including the early Islamic world.

She was previously awarded the Wheatley Medal for 1999 for the Cambridge History of Medieval English Literature; she has indexed the majority of the volumes of the new Cambridge Ancient History and was shortlisted for the Wheatley Medal in 1994 for Volume 5.

She read classics at Cambridge and held a graduate fellowship at the University of Athens, where she developed her interest in the Byzantine period. After a short career in the civil service, followed by some years at home with small children, she trained as an indexer, and has been surrounded by piles of proofs ever since. She is a past Vice-President of the Society of Indexers and has chaired its Training and Qualifications Board.

## Arthritis charity wins journalist vote

The Medical Journalists' Association (MJA) has voted Arthritis Care, a UK charity supporting arthritis sufferers, the Health Charity of the Year.

The user-led charity, which celebrated its diamond jubilee in 2007 and pre-dates

the NHS by one year, beat a distinguished field to scoop the coveted award. Fellow short-listed charities were the British Heart Foundation, Mencap, the Royal National Institute for the Blind, and the Prostate Cancer Charity.

'Arthritis Care aims to be the first point of call and one-stop-shop for anyone wanting to learn about arthritis in any of its 200 forms. This award is a vote of confidence in the information we provide the media and public, and it is fantastic that it comes from the big hitters of the MJA. They are the respected, authoritative communicators who influence health and public policy, so if we are helping them, then we're doing our own job of helping people with arthritis to get their voices heard', said Rachel Haynes, Arthritis Care's Director of Public Affairs, who collected the award at the ceremony at the Royal Society of Medicine in early July.

Arthritis Care provides free help lines and publishes a range of factsheets and booklets offering support to people with arthritis, or affected by it. It also offers free-to-user self-management courses, equipping people with long-term conditions to live 'smart', and to run their lives more effectively beyond the surgery door.

# Tools and resources

## The right reference for Microsoft Word 2007

*Katja McLaughlin MA (Hons) MISTC reviews the Microsoft Word 2007 Bible, which you might decide to add to your shelf of trusted reference books.*

*Word 2007 Bible* is aimed at both new users and veterans upgrading from previous versions, and is meant for use either as a tutorial or reference. At 915 pages, it offers a comprehensive exposition of the software. The book comes with a CD-ROM of video tutorials, and the author, Herb Tyson, also has a *Word 2007 Bible* blog for further questions at [word2007bible.herbtyson.com/](http://word2007bible.herbtyson.com/).

### What does it contain?

For new users, Tyson explains basic tasks without patronising and shows paths to more advanced functionality. For upgrading users, the book clearly points out feature changes. It also explains how to get hold of certain legacy features that have

been hidden so that they can no longer be accessed through the graphical user interface, but are still present and can be reached otherwise. For users who already have a good grasp of Word's functionality, the author presents methods for making your work more efficient, including customisation and keyboard shortcuts. Tyson does this consistently throughout the book as he discusses different tasks.

One of the definite strengths of the book is that in addition to simply describing the software, the author also evaluates Word's features: he gives praise to Word's functionality and interface design where praise is due, but also points out potential pitfalls. Experienced users often seem to accumulate this kind of valuable information from Internet discussion forums or through trial and error, so finding some of this advice in a guide book is a great help. For example, Tyson offers a frank discussion of the potential dangers of using master pages and the 'Automatically update' option for styles.



Another distinctive feature is Tyson's witty writing style, which involves a hint of humour. Some readers might have reservations about this in a software guide, but here the author's choice of expressions is part and parcel of the candid evaluation of Word's features and 'telling it like it is'. Overall, it leaves you with the impression that Tyson is reflecting honestly upon his experiences, and serves well to make such a lengthy book more readable, especially if used as a tutorial rather than reference.

## Who is it really for?

While *Word 2007 Bible* starts by covering the basics and helps new users build up their skills, absolute beginners and casual Word users might prefer a more concise title that focuses solely on the fundamentals. For example, the instructions about starting Word go on to explain not only the concept of safe mode but also document command-line switches in some detail.

You are likely to benefit from this book, if you already have a grasp of Word basics and are now looking for details about the rest of the program's functionality. With impressive breadth of coverage and a good level of depth, this book is a useful reference work for technical communicators. Will it tell you all you need to know about Word, then? Not quite, but at the point where you leave *Word 2007 Bible* behind, you are probably entering the territory of the sort of usage strategies that may be best developed through the experience of working with real-life problems rather than reading books.

Finally, for the absolute Word experts among you, *Word 2007 Bible* might still be useful for all the legwork that the author has done in laying out the design of the new features and investigating what Word 2007 is doing behind the scenes.
