Education in Technical Communication – A Cause for Concern!

The ISTC has a formal interest in the education and training of its members. Our Memorandum of Association spells out two key responsibilities. The first is to lay down standards of education, training, knowledge, and experience appropriate for membership. The second is to promote, establish, and assist in the provision of those education and training programmes considered essential if 'students' are to attain the standards laid down. In addition the ISTC's support for those members embarking on continual-professional-development programmes can only be sustained by a flourishing education resource.

A recent study has shown that the range and number of courses currently available to obtain qualifications in technical communication have declined over the last ten years. Even worse, some of the courses now available are under threat of closure.

It is felt that without strenuous efforts by the ISTC and its members to improve matters, we could be left without any formal technical communication qualification courses below postgraduate level within two years. Consequently, your council is embarking on an emergency programme to revitalise the provision of education in the field of technical communication (which includes information design and technical illustration/graphics).

Don Hinson has been co-opted onto the council to head a small team with two objectives. The first is to support, promote and sustain current technical communication courses, and the second is to initiate and assist in the establishment of new education programmes appropriate to our membership standards.

Dave Griffiths (Kudos) - History of technical communication tools.

Alan Fisk – AuthorIT (the presentation will be from a user's point of view, so that both the attractions and the irritations of AuthorIT will be displayed).

Steve Cartmell - Single Source Publishing with Doc-To-Help 6.0 (this presentation will look at some of the features in Doc-To-Help 6.0 that make it an ideal single source authoring tool).

Rick Webster - A Migration Marathon (with the aim of starting off a discussion rather than being a straight talk)

Ron Blicq - Writing proposals (the emphasis will be on writing short and medium-length proposals, rather than comprehensive proposals)

Florence Dujardin - Research as tool of the trade (identifying useful sources, highlight benefits, and giving pointers on how to approach research in technical communication).

Carol Johnston: Digitext Paper 1 - Designing and writing for the screen (this session explores paper-based and online documentation, their relative strengths and weaknesses and their impact on both the reader and the technical author).

Carol Johnston: Digitext Paper 2 - Single Sourcing: An Introduction (this session provides an introduction to the benefits of single sourcing and the obstacles to successfully completing a single source project).

Jill Fifoot - Creating documents with translation in mind (this paper briefly reviews the impact of documentation format on the effectiveness of such tools as translation memory, and hence on the savings which can be made with such tools).

Michelle Medhat - Online training (this presentation will introduce a unique portfolio of 3 integrated Products - LearnTrack, ViewletBuilder and iCreate - that come together to provide any-sized organisation with a rapid, affordable solution to simply create and deliver on line training).

Nathan Birtle - Arbortext (using XML to get the most from your content of this session will also learn how an XML-based system provides a robust, modular, reusable and easily maintainable information collection that can expand current publishing processes and provide new opportunities such as personalised publishing and just-in-time integration of business data).

Ian Boulton - Bowne (Global Solutions) - Total Product Support, the Value Chain concept (many organisations are reaping the benefits from adopting structured documentation, single source publishing or translation memory, but what happens if we place all of these concepts and more under the same umbrella?)

Rik Page (Mekon) - Mekon have been pioneering Single Source Publishing Solutions for many years and will give a product independent guide to the benefits and pitfalls based on real experience.
