Editor: Tell me a bit about yourself, Chantel.

Google announce Docsy


A new TechComm website theme called Docsy has been announced on the Google Open Source Blog.

Docsy has been specifically designed to support the growing demand for good documentation for open source projects. It includes templates to provide an easy way to create a website with features specifically designed to support technical documentation.

Special features include site navigation and multi-language support. There is also guidance on how to add additional pages, structure your documentation, and accept community contributions, all with the goal of helping you get a working documentation site up and running quickly so that you can focus on creating great content.

Hotter than the surface of the sun



Britain's largest privately-owned nuclear fusion facility, which aims to generate a plasma temperature hotter than the surface of the sun, is under construction in Buckinghamshire.

It is being developed by <u>Pulsar Fusion</u>, spearheaded by nuclear entrepreneur Richard Dinan. State-of-the-art equipment has been shipped from around the world to fit out the new facility.

Mr Dinan, author of *The Fusion Age*, is confident that the organisation will generate temperatures above 100 million degrees Celsius within the next three months. Once fully operational, the team of nuclear

physicists plan to harness the technology to power space exploration and advanced clean energy innovations.

"Not only does nuclear fusion have the potential to solve the world's energy crisis, but it will also lead to countless other technological innovations not least the tantalising possibility of high-speed space travel", says Mr Dinan. The company claims fusion rockets hold the potential to halve journey times to Mars, and even offer humanity the ability to leave our solar system.

Mr Dinan also explains, "nuclear has a bad name because humans initially used its power to create weapons, but there is a totally safe, clean other side to it that is demonstrated by the stars. The same technology that allowed us to do the worst thing we have ever done, will give us the ability to do the best thing we will ever do: generate abundant, powerful clean energy. Pulsar Fusion was set up out of a relationship with a lot of nuclear physicists who know the science is there now. Why should something that is possible today wait for tomorrow?"

It sounds like some exciting TechComm opportunities could result from these developments.

Tricks of the trade

Think outside the box

Being organised is a key skill for technical communicators. You can often have a number of projects on the go at once and being organised makes it a lot easier to keep track of where exactly you are with all of them. Having a system that works for you makes tracking tasks a lot easier.

My top tip is to look beyond the obvious places such as project management books and instead look at what organisational experts do. A lot of these experts are focused on organising the household, and so at first glance they may not seem like the best candidates to offer technical communication tips. However, I have found their tips to be very transferable to our profession.

Like many of you, I live by a to-do list. At work, I use a Microsoft OneNote template for my weekly to-do list. In the past, I tried to make it as detailed as possible and I would end up with a page full of black writing and a heavy heart knowing I would never get through it in a week. About two years ago, I

came across an organisational expert online called Cassandra Aarssen (http://clutterbug.me/). Her "Clutterbug Philosophy" focuses on household organisation (how to organise your rooms, how to create a cleaning and chore chart etc.), but what really caught my eye was her section about organisational styles. The more I read of it, the more I realised why my to-do list wasn't working for me. I am a visual person and I like a lot of colour, but it never occurred to me to incorporate this into my weekly schedule. My to-do list was always just a long page of black text.

Taking this advice on board, my new to-do list is a page with two columns. On the right, is my dumping ground. At the start of the week I fill this section up with everything I need to do for the week. These tasks vary, and can include anything from requesting information from someone, to working on documentation changes, or meetings with SMEs. My tasks are categorised by either the product they are associated with or put into a miscellaneous section. I don't get too bogged down in the detail – every task is just one line. If more detail is needed, I include a link or reference on where to look for more information.

On the left of the page I list the days of the week, each in a different colour. Once I've written all the tasks in the dumping ground, I distribute the tasks among the days based on priority. Each task is given the same colour as the day it will be completed on. Using colour like this helps me to quickly see what needs to be done on any given day. Once the task has been completed I scratch it off the list.

This method has made it easier to see the tasks that are urgent, and it has also helped me to provide better estimates of how long individual tasks will take me.


