Whether online or printed, the impact of highly effective documentation is felt by industry, commerce, academia and most of all, users. Individuals and teams that develop excellent information products deserve to have their efforts recognised, as do the companies that invest in them.

The Awards are open to any individual or team, whether employed, self-employed, contracting, volunteering, permanent, temporary, full-time or part-time. You do NOT have to be a member of the ISTC to nominate someone, and the nominee doesn't have to be to a member of the ISTC either. And yes, you can nominate yourself if you wish; the judges' decisions will be made solely on the merits of the entries, not on

Would you like to join the ISTC Council?

We are currently looking for new Council members. If you would like to become more actively involved in the work of our Institute this could be the perfect opportunity.

The ISTC Council is the governing body of the Institute and any corporate member (MISTC or FISTC) is eligible for election. The Council sets priorities for the Institute,



approves the budget, sets the level of subscription fees, and elects the ISTC President. All members of Council, including the President, are volunteers.

Council holds about six web-based conference call meetings each year, as well as at least one in-person meeting. Council members lead various ISTC activities such as Area and Special Interest Groups, publications (*InfoPlus* and *Communicator*), accreditation of third-party courses, CPD, Awards, and TCUK.

While you don't need to be on Council to contribute to the work of the ISTC – for example, most local group leaders aren't Council members – there are activities that the Institute could address more successfully if there were Council members to lead them. Possible activity areas include developing the Institute's relationships with governmental and other organisations, research into relevant educational programmes, or overseeing the establishment of additional industry-specific special interest groups. But these are just suggestions.

If you are interested in joining the ISTC Council, nominations for membership are requested for election at our AGM which will be held on 11 September 2019 during the TCUK conference. Nominees must be of corporate grade (Fellow or Member), proposed and seconded by corporate members and supported by five other members, two of whom may be in noncorporate grades. A nomination form can be found here, and this form should be accompanied by a statement – of no more than 250 words – outlining your background and reasons for wishing to serve on Council.

Please contact the <u>ISTC office</u> if you wish to be nominated for Council membership and require assistance in finding supporters, if you would like to know more about the work of the Council, or if you are interested in volunteering elsewhere within the Institute. We will be happy to arrange for you to speak with a Council member who can answer your questions.

The last day for the receipt of nominations (either by email or by post) is 31 July 2019.

Murdered cutlery and halved physalises (or "How joining the local ISTC group changed our lives")

The Thames Valley ISTC group has existed in its present form for about five years under

the benevolent stewardship of our splendid coordinator, Darren Mitcham. A number of local authors have graced our meetings on and off over the years but there is a core group of regulars who have been

coming since the early days. At the behest of *InfoPlus* Copy Editor, Lisa Topping, we spent some time at our last meeting pondering exactly what keeps us turning up.

We started by considering why we each started coming to the meetings in the first place. The founder members had been invited by then ISTC President Paul Ballard who had made the initial efforts to establish the group. Others were recommended to come by their ISTC mentor as part of their CPD. One or two had been attracted by a particular meeting topic that sounded interesting or useful to them in their roles. Another was about to be made redundant and was interested in finding out about the local job market (several potential authors

have also come along over the years to find out more about a career in the profession). Yet another mentioned a desire to meet other technical communicators close to home and on a more regular basis than conferences allow.

The discussion then shifted to what we had got out of the group in the years since. This also produced a wide range of responses. Some were perhaps expected and are a testament to the efforts of the group to be relevant to its members. These included meeting expert speakers, learning about the diverse industries in which members work, hearing about the challenges that others face in their roles (especially beneficial as many of us are sole authors), and discussing examples of best practice that each of us have encountered. Advice is often sought on whether something at work is "normal" as the opinions of the group collectively represent a great many years of experience in technical communication. Details of job and contract opportunities are often exchanged. A regular feature that has developed is a session after the TCUK conference each year to discuss what was presented for the benefit of those who were unable to attend, which is always appreciated.

During this discussion it also became clear that, as time has gone by, many regular attendees have also gained some unexpected benefits. The majority of our meetings are quite informal and often revolve around a meal and a lot of laughing and chit-chat before the main subject of the evening is discussed. Food is often a focus for these preliminaries, such as lamenting the use of half a physalis as a garnish (when the other half is discarded!) and discussing the dubious practice of decorating a dessert plate with the outline of a spoon's "corpse" in icing sugar. In this relaxed atmosphere, some strong friendships have formed and many members are often in regular contact with each other between the monthly meetings. This network has proven valuable in giving non-judgemental support and empathy with issues (both professional and personal).

But it goes further than this. Members often encourage each other to step outside their comfort zones. An example of this is presenting at TCUK, where Thames Valley group members have made several contributions in recent years. We usually set aside a meeting in advance of the conference to allow a member to practice their talk in front of a friendly audience and receive positive, constructive feedback.

One member went so far as to say that they wouldn't have considered submitting a proposal at all without this support from the group. In a wider context, members said that they have felt more engaged with the ISTC as a whole as a result of coming to the group, and are more likely to participate in online discussions and competitions (such as the short story competition run in *InfoPlus*), and even volunteer to get more involved in the Institute's activities.

It seems that the benefits of being in a local ISTC group can go far beyond the formal enhancement of one's professional knowledge, as important as that is. Like most things, you get out what you put in, and for those of us who've attended regularly over a prolonged period of time and participated in the meetings as fully as possible, it's now hard to imagine life without the group!

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Tricks of the trade

Extracting embedded 3D files from PDFs

Don't you just love getting those clever 3D files embedded in your PDFs? You spin them around and can look at them from any angle. Great isn't it? Problems start when you'd like to use them to make new graphics. Acrobat stores them in a certain format and they're locked. If you do want to use them to create a new graphic or just use information contained in the PDF as a guide, you're stuck and have to create new graphics from scratch, which is time consuming, expensive and frustrating.



3D PDF

At one time I was receiving these files on a regular basis and I spent a lot of time trying to export and reuse them. Many online sources tell you to use this or that software but, personally, the only reliable solution I found was to use a piece of software called SimLab composer. You can download the trial and use it for 21 days and there are many versions for sale. The Pro version is reasonably priced and does the trick, extracting the 3D file in various formats which are then fully editable.
