logged on, go to the “Our Community” page (in the top or side menu) and then click on the “Discussion Forums” link.

The ISTC forum has five boards, each one dedicated to a different topic, for example “newbies”, “jobs”, etc. If you are new to the discussion forum, we recommend you start with the “Forum House Rules and Admin” post on the “Technical Communication” board to familiarise yourself with our rules of conduct in the forum.

You can read any topic on any of the boards by clicking on the title of the topic. To post a reply, go to the end of a topic and type your reply in the reply box and then click “submit”. If you wish to post a new topic, decide which board it best fits under and at the bottom of the page for that board, type your topic in the “Create New Topic” box. If you wish to be notified of replies to your question, please ensure that the “Notify me of follow-up replies via email” box is ticked. Once you are happy with your post, click “submit”.

If you want to be kept informed about a topic you haven’t posted on, you can click on “subscribe” (in the top right-hand corner when you have the topic open) and an email notification will be sent to you if someone comments on the topic, or creates a new

topic on that board. You can subscribe to receive notifications for each board by clicking the “subscribe” button at the top of each board once you are in it.

Please note, if you set up notifications for topics or boards the notification will go to the email address which you logged on with. If you do receive a notification via email, please be aware that you will have to log back on to the website to read the post.

Education England (NHS). It currently has over nine million learners.

Bletchley Park being transformed into Institute of Technology



A consortium led by Milton Keynes College, and which includes several prestigious partners (Microsoft, KPMG, McAfee, Evidence Talks, VWFS, Activate Learning and Cranfield University), has been awarded Government funding to build an Institute of Digital Technology at Bletchley Park, with two additional hubs in Oxford and Reading.

The eight organisations have been granted £28 million to refurbish Block D at the historic site, which was home to Britain's codebreakers in World War II, including Alan Turing and the famous Enigma machine.

A thousand students a year are expected to attend the Institute for technical qualifications, higher apprenticeships and training to help tackle the UK digital skills gap in roles such as cybersecurity.

Tricks of the trade

The power of F4 – a tip for Microsoft Word users

I still use, without thinking, a lot of the keyboard shortcuts I learnt in early versions of Word; though sometimes I come unstuck,

because the design anthropologists at Redmond decided to do away with or change some of them.

In this tip, I'll be concentrating on the **F4** key, which (usually, but not always) repeats everything you have done since the last time you moved the insertion point (mouse or keyboard) or issued a command. So, if you type "qwerty", move the mouse and use **F4** it types "qwerty" again – or sometimes "werty". (I have never worked out why it sometimes misses off the first character.)

It doesn't repeat *absolutely* everything – some table and graphic layer operations come to mind.

However, if you want to go through a document changing styles (e.g. reformatting lists or headings in a document to look the same) or applying complicated character formatting (e.g. bold purple Comic Sans 24pt!) consistently, or repeating the insertion of text, cross-references or comments etc., it can be very handy.

Personally, I'm a stickler for doing things with styles whenever possible, but if a big document lands on my desk formatted throughout in Normal (yes, that still happens!), **F4** can be the key to a quick and dirty edit if time is tight. And sometimes, applying bold or italic without a character

style just saves precious time – I’m sure we’ve all done it!

Its big brother, **Shift/F4**, repeats the last find operation – so you can zip through a document using **Shift/F4** to find a string and **F4** to repeat the change you first made. Why not use the replace function? Well, I find the two-key routine easier to manage than **Alt/F** and **Alt/R** shortcuts unless I am convinced I really want to change every instance in a document. (True touch typists will scoff, but I still hunt and peck.)

What’s *your* favourite Word function key?

Do you have a TechComm trick or tip to share? Have you recently come across something that made you exclaim, “If only I’d know that sooner!”? It might be software-related, a grammar tip, the discovery of a particularly useful YouTube tutorial...
