

Scientists as storytellers

The recent 2019 State of Science Index from 3M revealed that a third of respondents were sceptical of science, believing that it causes as many problems as it solves. Many admit that scientists should be using simple, everyday language in scientific discussions and, at the same time, they want to understand how science can help them live longer, healthier lives or get better-paying jobs.

The belief that scientists who tell stories that lead with the benefits to humanity will connect with audiences more effectively inspired 3M to create a "Scientists as storytellers" guide.

The guide, which is free to download, features advice from world-renowned experts in communication — like former NASA astronaut, Captain Scott Kelly — as well as professional scientists who share proven practices in effective storytelling.

If you've ever faced challenges when explaining science to non-scientists, this could be a useful resource to refer to.

What three words

No, this isn't about the three words that you feel are most overused, or that you wish were used more often, or that you simply like the most. This is about how three words could save a person's life – perhaps yours, or someone you know – or help to simplify

many business scenarios.

Co-founded in London in 2013 by Chris Sheldrick, what3words is a simple way to talk about location. The company has assigned each 3m square in the world a unique three-word address that will never change.

The system covers the entire world, never needs updating, and works offline. A three-word

address is a human-friendly way to share very precise locations with other people, or to input them into platforms and machines such as autonomous cars or e-commerce checkouts. It is optimised for voice input and contains built-in error prevention to immediately identify and correct input mistakes.

The free what3words app, available for iOS and Android, and the online map enable people to find, share and navigate to three-









K is for Kenilworth

Sharing some random facts about the location of our TCUK conference is becoming a tradition. So here goes. Did you know that:

- A settlement has existed at Kenilworth since at least 1086; the Domesday Book recorded it as "Chinewrde", meaning "farm of a woman named Cynehild".
- From medieval fortress to Elizabethan palace, the extensive remains of Kenilworth
 Castle have a fascinating 900-year history. This article in The Telegraph considers if it might be England's most romantic ruin.

- Warwick Castle, founded by William the Conqueror, is only a few miles from our TCUK venue too. You'll be in heaven if castles are your thing!
- Other sights worth seeing include the ruins of <u>St Mary's Abbey</u>, <u>Abbey Fields</u> park, and the town's clock tower.
- Sir Walter Scott's novel Kenilworth. A Romance appeared anonymously in 1821.

- There's a MAD museum nearby. If you're more interested in mechanical art and marble runs than ruins and historical novels, this is for you. "MAD" stands for Mechanical Art and Design, and it's the only such venue in the UK. The museum supports STEM subjects, and encourages kids of all ages to play with the quirky interactive kinetic art and automata. Think Wallace and Gromit this is somewhere to go to release your inner inventor.
- The neighbouring town of Royal Leamington Spa was voted the happiest place to live in Britain a couple of years ago.
- Speaking of happiness, there's also chocolate nearby. Lots of it. <u>Cadbury</u> <u>World</u> is located in Bourneville on the southern edge of Birmingham.
